Mayflower Mentions by Marti Bobertz

Luckily for me, living where I do in Plymouth MA, lots of Mayflower Mentions and Pilgrim Progresses come across my horizon on a daily basis. For you, the readers, this newsletter may be the majority of your attention to your 1620 ancestry. It is only fair that I give the editor a boost and tell you about some of the latest.

Books to read: *Mayflower Day by Day*, compiled by W Becket Soule, came as a gift to me. While I have not read all 482 pages yet, I have been impressed with the methodology of the book. There is a write up for every day of the journey from Jul 1620 to Dec 1621. Each is an "easy read". There are quotes from the primary sources, *Of Plimmoth Plantation* and *Mourt's Relation*. Interspersed throughout, are paragraphs that reflect on the life and times and the known facts about the travelers done by contemporary authors. Back in the day, this book surely would have been among those in my grandmother's "sitting room".

We have seen John Carver several times in the past six months, so perhaps now is a good time to look at him more closely. John was born at Great Bealings, Suffolk in 1581, so he was just shy of 40 on this voyage....

Activities Abound: If you are ever able to come to Plymouth, check for the activities that might be available when you can come. Even from home, a lot of these are posted on Facebook or provide a zoom link, so you can see what goes on and do some learning...

In August, the first four Friday's at 6 pm is the Pilgrim Progress. We march, in costume, to the beat of a drum to the top of Burial Hill where a short service and singing psalms from the Ainsworth psalter happens. It is quite often recorded and played on the Pilgrim Progress Facebook page. See if you can find me in costume!

On Friday, August 8th, *Mayflower II* will be celebrating a week of sea trials and her renewed United States Coast Guard

certification with a day sail in Cape Cod Bay. I'm sure hoping to capture some photos, but there will be lots posted on Facebook. Keep an eye out.

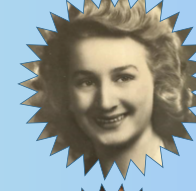

The **Mayflower Descendants in the State of South Dakota** have donated a "Lakota Star Quilt". Lakota star quilts are highly valued cultural symbols gifted at significant life events, representing honor, respect, and connection to the "star nation" or ancestors. Adopted during the reservation era as a gift-giving tradition when buffalo hides became scarce, these eight-pointed star designs replace the traditional star-patterned buffalo robes and are given for births, graduations, marriages, and to honor prominent individuals. Receiving a star quilt is a profound gesture, symbolizing protection and the warmth of the community, while the quilts themselves are a testament to Lakota artistry and resilience.

From Your Deputy Governor

"Why I joined the Mayflower Society"

Hello fellow pilgrims. That almost sounds like John Wayne! I want to tell a story of how a friend came to want to join the SD Mayflower Society. If you have read your Fall 2025 Mayflower Quarterly Magazine, you know that there is request for 300 word articles discussing the topic of "why did I join".

Our family has written about what we are doing with our ancestors in a prior issue. Let me describe how a friend was motivated to join. Barry Barber is a third-generation rancher from the Badlands. His family are neighbors and friends of our family for 135 years. When I was in grade school I met his mother's family. Their name was Alden but it meant nothing to me at that age.

Fast forward when I asked Barry for an oral history about our families in Dakota Territory. When we discussed our connection to the Mayflower, he said I believe my mother's family traces back to the Mayflower as well! We did some research as I told him that name sounded familiar. Sure, enough, John Alden was a signer of the Compact and a passenger arriving at Plymouth. He was known as a respected member and a magistrate of the colony. We found that there are approximately 1 million Alden descendants that include Presidents John Adams and John Quincy Adams and singer Marilyn Monroe. There is an Alden Kindred of America that maintains the clan records.

Barry lives in Nebraska but told me he wants to come to the meeting in Rapid City. He has a book of the Alden lineage and wants to get help in his application. I told him he would be welcome and there will be people there to assist.

The takeaway is this. It will help our Society if each of us to talk to people about your personal membership and why you joined the Society. Per Family Search.org, there is believed to be 35 million living descendants in the world and 10 million living in the United States.

We need more members. I call on you to ask people to join the Society. Tell them we are here to help them in their application as that seems to be an obstacle. Recently we started a "check-in" calling program of current members. It has resulted in more potential candidates for membership from our members' friends and members.

If we want to perpetuate our Society and stay viable, this is vital. I thank you for your membership and hope you will pick up the phone or go have coffee with your friends and neighbors!

68th Annual Meeting of
Society of Mayflower Descendants in the State of SD
(a 501 C3 Organization)
5 October 2024
Armour, South Dakota

Governor Randy Olivier opened the meeting at 10:00 a.m. Thirty members were present, and four members were on Zoom. The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Governor General Lisa Pennington, followed by a prayer from the Pilgrims at Prayer booklet by Elder Philip Blum.

DGG Carter Wiese spoke about the GBOA, including some highlights from their September trip to Asheville, NC.

- Their meeting was held two weeks before the flooding.
- There is a new Easy Application Generator to help with new memberships.
- A new DNA policy and committee are in place to help prove lineage using DNA.
- 1620 Club—This is a club of donors who pledge at least \$1,620 annually. These funds help the Governor General fund projects not within the budget. This money is being used to restore the Mayflower Meeting House in Plymouth. Five million dollars have been spent. They've raised 8.5 million and still need 7.7 million to complete the restorations. It will be amazing when finished.
- Plymouth would like each state society to send 5k to help the Governor General with her restorations.
- The 1620 Bells are redone in the Meeting house. Soon, they will be turned on and play Christmas songs.

DGG Carter Wiese introduced our General Society Guests:

- **Secretary General:** Martin "Marty" Beerman from Nebraska
- **Historian General:** Alexandra "Allie" Shires Golon from Colorado is working on the Easy App Generator to help historians with new members. The new application system will be a game changer. She is also working with Chris Schlosser on indexing ALL Mayflower applications. They need indexers to help.
- **Captain General:** Collier Wiese from South Dakota
- **Member at Large:** Christine "Chris" Schlosser from Wisconsin - head of the tech committee and works closely with Allie Golon.'
- **Governor General:** Lisa Pennington from Texas gave a PowerPoint presentation on her current project of restoring the Meeting House and the history of the Mayflower passengers and society.

Reports of Officers and Committees:

- **Governor Randy Olivier**
 - Discussed possibly meeting more than once a year. This can be accomplished with coffee meetings in different locations. This was discussed among members and could be a way of getting more involved.
 - Randy wants to update our SD website. He believes the cost could be between \$5,000 and \$7,000. Collier Wiese moved to investigate and move forward with a more dynamic website with officers' spending discretion, and Shelley Seager seconded.
 - It was discussed that a handheld mic could be used during the meeting if we continue to use Zoom so participants can hear more easily. Officers will look into this.

- **Governor Randy Olivier** (continued)
 - Scholarship and Membership Outreach Committee. Barb Harms moved to add an education committee, which Sharon Wiese seconded. Barb volunteered to chair the committee.
 - Would like to look into a Quarterly Newsletter sent electronically.
- **Treasurer Cynthia Nelson** distributed the written report.
- **Secretary Tammy Bourne** referred everyone to the newsletter's report on new, dropped, and deceased members and asked members to update us with emails so we could start sending more information electronically. Robin Fansler moved to approve the report, which Shelley Seager seconded. The motion carried.
- **Historian Robin Fansler** discussed the role of the historian and membership.
- **Surgeon Stuart Rice** wants to write a column about the mortality rate of passengers with many diseases. He wants to dig into the life spans back then and childbirth/mortality.
